

## **Maxwelton Mop Up in H Canyon**

Since the start of the resurvey in 2019, I've been in McClung Cave, WV 100 times, so I eagerly joined Nick's mop-up survey on Saturday, March 23 in Maxwelton in order to do something different for a change. And besides, I hadn't been in Maxwelton since December of 2022 – well over a year! The plan was to clean up loops and push leads in the H Canyon maze area. It was also the plan to get at least 600 feet of new survey in order to put the Great Savannah Cave System over 54 miles!

We met at the Scott Entrance on a cloudy morning at 10am. Luckily the rain had stopped. We had seven cavers for two teams on this trip, but as it turned out, only six of us went in. Nick Socky had made an offer to purchase a house in Blacksburg so he had to stay outside so he could contact his real estate agent if needed. That left us with two teams of three each: Joe Zokaites, Alina Valop, and I were on one team, while Alex Faunce, Nikki Fox, and Eli Meyer were the second team. Nick distributed printouts of the map and leads and we were on our way by 10:45am.

This was not a vertical trip, so we took the route in where you bypass the 30foot rope by doing the belly crawl and funky ledge, which has nails to make it easier. The crawlway to the Monkey Fecal Passage and then the Toilet Bowl was the same as ever and then we turned left at the Latte Room, heading for the entrance to H Canyon. At the start of H Canyon is a short scary traverse to the left of a 30foot drop to the stream below. The traverse has a somewhat slanted. muddy footstep with no good hand holds and is easier if you are long legged. It is a spot where Ed re-Saugstad fused to go to anymore after scaring himself senseless a few

times. However, last year, Nick put in a traverse line around the drop which makes the move a lot safer and easier. He also put in a webbing handline down the 15-foot climbdown into the H Canyon proper. It's a place you still want to be very careful at, but I was a lot happier doing it this time.

H Canyon was as cool as ever -a 50foot-high canyon which is 10 to 15 feet wide in spots with a small stream flowing down the center. Near the beginning are sets of intricate helictites, soda straws, and yellow white blobs of calcite. A few spots have infeeder waterfalls with beautifully formed flowstone

on the floor. Near the end of H Canyon is a section where you have to climb up high, requiring fun steps across the narrow canyon and slippery stemming in order to stay high. Some places were a bit of a challenge for our short-legged crew members.

At the end of H Canyon, you climb up high into what looks like a terminus breakdown only to pop out into a large room called the Brokedown Room. From here it was just a short jaunt to the entry into the H Canyon Maze. There are two ways into the maze. The way I've done it before is a narrow awkward canyon which you have to squirm through sideways, then a low, wet, muddy crawlway tube which eventually pops out into a small room. The other way is through a low, but dry belly crawl which I couldn't fit through last time I was there. Nick swore they had dug the crawl out and that I could now fit. Ok - I was willing to try it. And, low and behold, I did fit, barely. Within minutes we were at the start of the 'Big Person' survey. Joe and I were the 'big persons'!

We agreed with the other team to meet back at the start of the crawl at 8pm. Our lead was the first right hand turn. We crawled in, following survey stations until we got to a low room with 4 leads taking off from all directions. The survey stations ended here, so we got our gear out and started surveying.

We went around to the right to start out, bypassing a miserable looking crawl, but ended up pushing a low breakdown crawl until Alina couldn't fit anymore. PUD shot. Back at the last intersection, we cut back around and tied back into our first station. That left two leads. We took the left at our first station and after going through a tight squeeze, we (Continued on page 31)

popped out into a larger passage. Surprise – we found footprints and modern survey stations. We tied into the previous US6 station and then went over to SR6, where we figured the left lead there would tie back into our skipped miserable looking crawl. It did, and in the process, we had killed off 6 leads!

We still had a couple of hours left, so we proceeded further into the maze, killing off leads left and right (most were simple little loops that hadn't been surveyed before, plus one water crawl which was marked as Too Tight, but we actually got 40 feet of survey before it really got too tight. We finally ran out of time and headed back to our meetup point.

We were ten minutes late, but the other team wasn't there. However, there was a digging bar set up at the entrance to the tight exit crawl. We waited another 10 to 15 minutes and then decided they must

have left early, leaving the digging bar as an indication that they had exited. We left a note just in case and then headed out.

At the start of H Canyon, we found Nikki's seat harness at the bottom of the climb down. She had left it there on the way in because it wasn't needed anymore. So, they hadn't left before us after all. We climbed up, crossed the traverse, and started out when the other group caught up with us. So, as it turned out, we exited as a group after all. We climbed out of the entrance culvert to a chilly night at 11:05pm after a good 12.5 -hour trip. Unfortunately, we didn't get the 600 feet we needed. We got close -440 feet, so the next trip into either Maxwelton or McClung Cave will make the Great Savannah Cave System 54 miles. (Also, Nick didn't get the house he was outbid)

## Lost World Caverns, WV - Wild Cave Trip Report

We did the normal route we usually do. We saw Lots & Lots of pretty formations. Unfortunately we don't know the names of the different areas. I do know that apparently the latter section we went to was called the Sewer. I am just not sure what part of that latter sec-

tion. One part was a fun narrow passage with a few slightly difficult parts. It ended for most at a small waterfall, however, Jeff & Logan climbed above the waterfall & did part of the upper section. Once out of that passage, Jeff, Logan & I opted to do a just for fun small passage that has a very tight & difficult hole to get out of. The guys had more trouble than me since they are bigger. Lots of pictures taken there!

Our last section was through a crawl with lots of mud sculptures. It ended at

some more pretty formations. Then we had to go through another super tight & this time very wet hole to get out. Luckily we saved this for last so were weren't wet for very long since we headed straight out.

We did notice that Mike Phelps had a group there doing Grapevine Pit. On the way out of the tourist part of the cave, we got to see 2 cavers coming down the ropes. I also got to speak with Mike for a bit inside the gift shop. He invited Jeff, Kelly & me to come up to see the new

rigging Steve Silverberg has come up with.

Our overall time in the cave was just under 4 hours. We thanked Steve multiple times for allowing us to come. I also discussed with Steve the possibility of us trying to come sometime during the summer to do Grapevine Pit.

## McClung Cave - Lower Gymnasium, WV

It was WVACS Project Weekend and I was considering several possibilities for a survey in McClung Cave, WV. I still hadn't decided what to do by Friday night, but going into the McClung Historic entrance was out, since there needed to be at least 48 hour notice in asking Mystik Miller for access to that entrance.

Ultimately, we decided on going into the Lightner Entrance and doing a good lead at the end of the Lower Gymnasium. Our team for this day (April 13, 2024) was Nikki Fox, Kelly McCarthy, Rob Wardell, and I. It was a somewhat unique trip, since we were all experienced sketchers, plus between the 4 of us, we had five DistoX2s and plenty of sketch books. We only took in three Distos and two books, though.

We took a drill and digging supplies plus a hammer and sledge. This was the lead that looked like it would need only one straw: it was 18 feet deep, and was vertical. So we brought our vertical gear too.

Our trip down the Lightner Entrance, up Broomstick Passage, and into the Gymnasium was uneventful. A little route finding with the map got us down into the Lower Gymnasium and to our lead.

It turned out the rock was not good for straws, but broke up pretty easily with the rock hammer and sledge. After about an hour of work between the four of us, it was large enough to get in.

Rob went in first. The small hole belled out almost immediately into a 12-foot By David Socky

wide room with wet canyon passages going in two directions - upstream and downstream.

While I was still at the top, we started the survey and then I rappelled down the 19 foot deep drop. We decided to go downstream first since it was the direction that was going into 'white space'.

The stream passage started out wet, but after only a little bit, it was possible to traverse the passage and stay dry. The canyon was about 3 to 4 feet wide and 10 to 15 feet high. There were sections of breakdown where we had to scramble a bit, but it was not hard. To our surprise, we found very old boot prints in muddy sections of the passage. Damn, we weren't in virgin passage. This passage was certainly not on the old map. Where did they come from? There was no way they had come in the way we did. The hole we hammered open was only 4 to 5 inches wide.

Then I considered the upstream passage where we had started the survey. Going upstream was headed back toward a known passage which had a lead which was too tight for us to get through. Except for Bill Koerschner, who had squeezed through and reported 50 feet of going passage. He had turned around in a dome (turned out it was where we had rappelled in). We figured that a very thin caver from the original survey in the 70s had explored this passage, but they didn't survey it.

We kept surveying until we got to a spot where the passage got too tight. We left one lead - a belly crawl for small people. Kelly could barely fit, but there was no way Rob or I would fit.

We did one side lead, which was an upper level crawl which went over the top of the main passage, but got too tight.

Back at the rope, the canyon went upstream but just after 20 feet, we found BRB38. This was the lead that Bill Koerschner had gotten into, but no one else could fit. We tied into it, making a nice little loop and killing two leads (and leaving one lead).

It was a good 10 hour trip in which we surveyed 630 feet, all of it new (although only 100 feet or so was virgin). The Great Savannah Cave System is now over 54 miles long!



2/17: New River Cave, VA. The Blue Ridge Grotto had a great 5-hour trip into New River Cave. Jeff Huffman, Lauren Appel, Kelly Perkins, Nick Schmalenberger, Lisa Boutwell Graves, Isaiah Hall, & myself were all on the trip. We actually found the China Slide going in, but of course it took a bit of looking around. Same story when we got to the bottom of it. Trying to find the route out to the stream. None the less, we made it to the waterfall upstream. Afterwards we headed back out & went to the Forest Room. That too took a bit of scouting around, but we made it. This room is full of pretty formations. Of course, I forgot my camera in the car & I was too far up the trail & it was WAY too cold, so I didn't go back to get it. (Susan Burr)

**3/16: McClung Cave, WV.** Participants included David Socky, Joe Zokaites, Matt Centofanti, and Andrew Allard. We went back to the end of the Broomstick Room near the Second Breakdown to survey the rest of this passage we didn't find on the previous trip. The way on turned out to be really obvious and I was really disappointed in myself for not finding it on the previous trip. Some really nice stuff, but also some crawly and gnarly stuff. It was a good 13.5-hour trip with 736 feet of survey. 300 feet of it was new.

3/16: Lost World Caverns, WV (Wild section) – Susan Burr, Jeff Huffman (leader), Kelly Perkins, Abbey Mays (guest), Alexander Koch (guest), Logan and Erin Van Hon (guests). See article on page 31. (Susan Burr)

**3/20: Pasco Dig, VA.** Participants included David Socky, Joe Zokaites, Keith Sweeney, Rick Lambert, and Bill Koerschner. We did technical digging on the same hole we ended our day on 2/21. We spent most of the day widening the way down and then did a number of straws to get through the next tight spot. There is still more to do, but rocks roll a good ways down. Just can't tell how wide it is yet. We quit around 4:45pm

**3/22:** Trish Geiger reported on going to **Ana Te Pahu lava tube** on Easter Island of Chile, South America.

**3/23: Maxwelton Cave, WV**. Participants included David Socky, Joe Zokaites, and Alina Valop. Team 2: Nikki Fox, Alex Faunce, and Eli Meyer. We went to H Canyon to mop up leads. We were trying to get 600 feet to get the Great Savannah Cave System to 54 miles. But only got 467 feet. Next time. It was a good 13-hour trip.

**3/24:** Nick Schmalenberger reported that he and Martin DiLeggi worked on a promising dig that is blowing air.

**4/10: Pasco Dig, VA.** Participants included David Socky, Joe Zokaites, Amos Mincin, Jim Schurman, Keith Sweeney, and Rick Lambert. Another dig on the Pasco Dig (temporarily named Das Boot Cave). We made about 7 feet of progress, doing about 5 or 6 technical digs. The way on looks grim. Amos did recover my boot, plus he was able to snag my dropped camera case.

4/13: McClung Cave, WV. Participants included David Socky, Nikki Fox, Kelly McCarthy, and Rob Wardell. Went into Lightner entrance and to the Lower Gymnasium dig lead. We got through the dig with a rock hammer and a sledge. It was a 19-footdeep drop, vertical gear required. We surveyed 633 feet of new cave, but only some of it was virgin. The Great Savannah Cave System is now over 54 miles long!

**4/17: Climbing at River Rock Climbing gym** with Dave Socky (reported by Nick Schmalenberger). We can't use our caving harnesses for climbing, but they let us use their spare gear. We may plan another night in 2 weeks if enough interest. Perhaps we can have a vertical practice there on a regular basis too?

**4/27: Unnamed Cave, VA.** Participants included David Socky, Mark Minton, Jacob Whitlock. We went to the historic downstream section to place dye traps in preparation of dye tracing efforts in the Warm Springs Project area. We entered the cave around 11:00am. We collected a previously placed dye trap, then headed downstream.

Lot of climbing up and down and between and through large breakdown blocks. There was a slippery slot to climb up, then back down to the water. Some short duck under spots to go through. Then there is the sump bypass. An old wooden ladder, with modern nails makes this climb up a piece of cake. At the top is where the cable ladder must be rigged. The way down is a narrow slot with a bit of a traverse, and then another tight awkward spot to go down. Then it's not bad. But the cable ladder is a pain in the ass. Especially getting back up. To be honest, it wasn't as bad as I was afraid it would be.

It was narrow enough that Jacob was worried about being able to climb back out. So, Jacob waited at the top of the climb while Mark and I went downstream with the traps.

After the cable ladder drop there is a water filled passage with a very deep floor channel which can be avoided if you don't slip off the sloping slippery underwater ledge. Eventually there is a large water-filled room near the end of the downstream section. Going through another narrow spot, we got to the room where there was a large infeeder to the right. The water was clear and cold, so most likely <u>not</u> from Mud Pot Cave. Mark put a dye trap in the infeeder and collected a sample of water. We then went a little further downstream in the main stream and placed the third trap. We were out by 3:30 pm for a nice 4.5-hour trip.

5/1: Dressler Cave, VA. Participants included David Socky, Bill Koerschner, Rick Lambert, Jim Schurman, and Keith Sweeney. We found this cave on the Dressler property (where Mud Pot is located). It had been noted before by Keith many years ago, but never explored. It was a pretty large near vertical entrance. I went in first and slid down a steep short slope which ended at a vertical drop off of about 15 feet into a large dry room. We rigged a cable ladder and then I went down to check out the room. I checked all the easy leads first, none of which went. The final lead required a climb up, then climbing down a windy phreatic narrow canyon for about 12 feet. But the last 6 feet was undercut with no foot holds to get back up. I couldn't tell if it continued, but it sounded like a dead end - not enticing. I decided not to try to climb down. I climbed back up and out and reported my finds. It was decided that this would be a perfect cave for the RASS survey students to survey, so I climbed back out and derigged the ladder. We spent the rest of the day ridge walking and then some work on one of the digs on the Pasco property.


5/4: Simmons Mingo Cave, WV. Participants included David Socky, Carl Amundson, Nikki Fox, Hunter Campbell, and three others. This was spring VAR led trip. Nikki and Hunter were the trip leaders. They took us on a loop that required doing about 7 or 8 vertical pitches, both up and down. Nothing difficult except one spot where you had to pull yourself over about 3 feet to the edge with a tag line to get off rope. All other drops/climbs were pretty easy and short. We went in the main large upper entrance, down the big rooms and through the Jar of Gravel (a vertical 3-D breakdown maze). There was one tight spot, but an easy exposed climb allowed you to bypass it on the way out. We went all the way down to the stream before we had to do any rope work. It was a fun 5 hour sport trip.

For the Roanoke event, Friday and Saturday, Dave Jackson of CaveSim says "I expect that it will indeed be helpful for us to have volunteers. For instance, cavers can help with the CaveSim SRT tower (the 12-foot-tall yellow A-frame that you've seen at NSS Conventions in the past), with the CaveSim squeezebox, and with teaching kids about cave conservation before/after they explore the CaveSim trailer."

And some background from Zena Orndorff, who is organizing the July CaveSim events - "A little background -I applied for a CCV grant last fall which is funding 5 days + travel expenses for the July events. The proposal indicated we'd target higher population areas -Richmond (2 days), Harrisonburg, Roanoke, and Bristol. I contacted Roanoke Parks and Rec about collaborating with a venue, and they were so enthused they subsequently got funding from USFS for a second day in Roanoke. We added a Blacksburg day to take advantage of this opportunity while CaveSim is in the area, but currently only have half the funding for it (still need ~\$1000). In addition to topping off the Bburg day we're hoping to have extra funds for educational materials to distribute to attendees. CaveSim provides some of that, but we'd like to do more, including adding some Virginia specific materials. If BRG would be willing to put a little something towards the July events it would be greatly appreciated, and if you're interested in volunteering at any of the events let me know (For the schedule, specific times TBD, at minimum 10am-4pm). We'll be putting out info at VAR so hopefully that will bring in more donations.
