

Resurvey of Dunn's Cave, VA

Survey participants included David Socky, Joe Zokaites, Bill Koerschner, and Bob Alderson.

We met at Keith Sweeney's house at 10:15am, but the data logging crew had taken off already. We found the waivers for Dunn's Cave, which we filled out and took with us. We then headed over to Dunn's Cave where we met up with Bill Jones. We turned over our liability waivers and Bill took us into the old Dunn's farmhouse where we had a look at the very old map that the owner had found. The map was probably done in the late 1800s and was scaled in paces. It was a real piece of history.

This was a special trip for me since it would be my first real caving after three months of recovering from broken ribs

and other injuries. I was really tired of doing nothing but bucket counting and rope tending on digs. Time to do some real caving!

We started our survey at the entrance at D1. The stooping entrance dropped down into the entrance room with a large side passage to the right and a tight little lead to the left. We surveyed into the passage to the right with one shot – it was 31 feet long and ended in some very nice old and dry formations. Calcite and flowstone all over. There was a side passage to the right which was small enough that I just sketched it.

Back in the main room, we continued down the main passage to the southeast. A solid wall to the right, and a huge drop block breakdown on the left with many little openings and crawls that went into the further reaches of the entrance room to the north-east. At A6 was a stoop way on the right which doubled back and went down a mud slope parallel to the main passage. There was a window into the main passage about 20 feet down. The parallel passage ended at A8.

We did one shot from A6 to A9 that led into the main upper-level south-east branch. But our goal was

not to do that section of the

cave. The plan was to cut back around to the hidden section of the entrance room. where the route to the lowerlevel stream passage was located and the lead to the other south-east branch took off from. This section of the cave was a jumbled mess of breakdown and convoluted interconnected tubes and canyons. Not the simplest thing to sketch. We surveyed around the right-hand portion of the room and eventually climbed up to a high point at the northern end of this section where there was a mud tube up a short 6-foot climb up. I did this little climb very

carefully, mindful of my ribs. The tube

was only 11 feet long and ended at a 10-foot climb down into the main northern end of the entrance room. I declined to do the tricky downclimb.

We surveyed around the down climb to the stream passage and even-

tually tied back into station A4. We again noted that what at first seemed to be a wall separating the sections of the entrance room was nothing but just a bunch of large breakdown blocks with multiple ways from one section to the other. This is where cross sections and profiles on the map are really important to show the true nature of this section of the cave. Also, Bill Koerschner took a strike and dip reading around A5.

We then did the little loop that exited at the small left-hand lead at the entrance. All in all, we had surveyed 23 stations for a total of 373 feet. We finished up about 4:30 pm, exiting to a very nice day with a pretty blue sky. We figured it would take maybe 3 or 4 more trips to finish the cave.

Breathing Cave, VA

We wanted to get into Breathing Cave before it closed down for the winter so we did a pick up on Saturday, 9/6/25. I normally am very good about estimating how long a trip will take, but I under estimated basically everything on this trip. It took about 2 hours or more to get there and about a 45 minute hike to the cave entrance. Our usual time in a cave is 3-5 hours. I had estimated about 4 hours for this one, but we ended up being in the cave for a little over 5 hours.

Our objective for this trip was to get to the waterfall at the end of Serpentine Way. That is my favorite passage and Jeff agreed to lead us there. This would be our first trip here without Doug Feller leading. We had maps with the route highlighted in yellow. Jeff is very good at navigating, but this cave is a little mazey. Between Jeff, Ben, Brian & Nick they figured it out. Did we make mistakes? Absolutely! My favorite one was when we went in a big circle & then had to figure out where we went wrong.

Everyone love going through the "Nutcracker" formation...NOT!!!!! Yes, there are several challenges in this cave, but we got through. This cave also has a lot of pretty formations as well. Unfortunately this day the water levels were very low so Serpentine Way was not as pretty/fun. On the way out we decided to check out the "Laundry Chute" passage. I couldn't remember what it was or where it went, but up the steep muddy slope we all went. Basically it is just a challenge to see if you can make it. Brian was super happy we decided to do that. LOL!

At the beginning of the trip Jeff had mentioned wondering what was in the Historic Section of the cave. I didn't

know but I really wanted to through the Serpentine Way so that is where we headed. Aswe were heading out everyone was pretty tired & getting sore. Once we were near the entrance I gathered the group up & asked if they would be okay with going to check out the Historic Section for just a little bit. I promised

wouldn't do anything difficult & wouldn't be in there very long. Everyone agreed & off we went. I think we reached a main passage in the Historic Section, but decided we had been there long enough & would save the rest for a return visit another time.

On the hike back to the cars, Lauren & I started rolling over dead logs looking for salamanders. We were successful. Almost everyone got into the mode of looking. We found a couple of Southern Two-lined & several Red-backed salamanders.

It was a long but fun day!


We did the normal tourist route for the

We did the first major climb down without any webbing. We rigged the second climb down with an etrier. Everyone was helpful in spotting and assisting as needed. The next big climb down was to get into the stream passage where we first headed upstream to see the waterfalls.

It is amazing how well decorated the cave is. So many walls & ceilings are covered with beautiful formations. Jeff was very helpful in lighting up the pretty

Grotto Trip Log

8/30: Nick Schmalenberger and Martin DiLeggi visited **Greyledge Cave, VA.** James River Grotto (JRG) had recently visited the cave.

9/3: Helene and Barry Ferguson visited **Crozet Tunnel, VA**. They did a thru trip, and back!

9/6: Nick Schmalenberger and Susan Burr reported on a cave trip to **Breathing Cave**, **VA.** (They visited on the last OPEN weekend before the cave is closed for winter: deer hunting season and bat hibernation.) This was the first time BRG folks navigated Breathing without Doug Feller pointing out the way. Objective was to the (not running) waterfall. They got lost on the way back & ended up doing a circle back to the scary slippery part. 5-hour trip. Next time we will go to the Historic Section of Breathing Cave.

9/9: Trish Geiger traveled to Colorado, where she visited Garden of the Gods, Cave Of The Winds, Manitou Springs, CO, Pagosa Springs, CO, and Mesa Verde National Park. Excellent Mesa Verde tour! The park interpreters were outstanding!

9/10: Various Caves WSP, VA. Participants included David Socky, Joe Zokaites, Keith Sweeney, Rick Lambert, Brian Keener, and Douglas Kemmer. We changed temperature loggers in: Dogwood Cave, Dressler Cave, Massie #1, Massie #2, Perry Campbell Cave, Rodent Hotel, and Collins Cave. We then went over to Triplet cave where Joe and Douglas went in through the pinch. Douglas said that he made it to the current next dig. We didn't do any digging or survey in Triplet. We were on the road by 3:30pm.

9/15: Dixie Caverns, VA. Participants included David Socky and Mary Sue Socky. Cleaning out the pool at the end of the cave. Used a hose to siphon to the dig/crawl. Siphon worked pretty good. Mary Sue was in from 11am until 3:30pam. Dave helped Jenna on the hilltop to see where the cave was.

9/17: Dixie Caverns, VA. Participants included David Socky, Mary Sue Socky, and Marian McConnell. Finished draining the pool and cleaned flowstone and formations. Hauled everything out. The cleanup was a success.

10/1: Dunn's Cave, VA. Participants included David Socky, Joe Zokaites, Bob Alderson, and Bill Koerschner. First survey for the resurvey of Dunn's Cave. We finished off the entrance room which included the breakdown mess. I sketched while Bill did cross sections and profiles and Joe was point and back sights while Bob was front sights. I did fine for my first cave trip in 3 months. I was still extra cautious and even accepted a spot and knee from Bob when climbing down from the mud tube. My ribs felt fine the whole time. We were done by 4:30 pm and had dinner at the Country Cafe.

10/4: Butler Cave, VA. Participants included David Socky, Eric Shuler, and Isabella Brown. Surveyed nice dry (mostly) walking passage in Pats Section just past the Air Dig. It was my second cave trip since my 3-month hiatus due to broken ribs. Did some crawling and tight 12-inch squeezes with no detrimental effects. Good survey. This was the BCCS Social/Project weekend, so there was a great spaghetti dinner at the Roost along with some great socializing. On the drive back home, I got sidetracked by a rescue in McClung Cave, WV.

10/4: McClung Cave, WV. On my drive back home from the Butler cave trip, I got a call from Mary Sue just before Eagle Rock. There was a rescue in McClungs going on. A group of nine cavers went into the historic entrance. A girl in the group dislocated her shoulder while arm rappelling down the back end of the First Breakdown. I called Mystik Miller, and she said to come. I showed up about 10:15pm. There was a bunch of fire trucks and ambulances right outside the entrance. When I got there, it was determined that there were enough people in the cave, so there was need to go in. I stayed out and chatted for 20 minutes until cavers started coming out. The injured girl soon emerged. She had a duct tape and webbing arm sling and was able to move along with minimal help. Nick Schmalenberger was there, and he got in as far as the nail climbs before the entrance canyon. I chatted for a while and then headed home. I got home at 1am.

8/29: Nick Schmalenberger and Tri-State Grotto cavers visited **My Cave, WV**. They went to the bottom of the (dry) waterfall. Three caving groups were in the cave. Two were doing Thru-trips.

2025: Ernst Kastning is continuing his Centennial of the Floyd Collings Accident tour. He has met descendants of the Collings family and other key people during the cave rescue, and has visited many of the area caves Floyd was familiar with: Sand Cave KY (accident site) Mammoth Cave NP, Floyd Colling Crystal Cave, KY, the Mammoth Cave Church and cemetery, and viewing "Floyd Collings – the Musical" shown in Bowling Green, KY.

The Speakers - The evening's presentation will be from Mark Minton and Yvonne Droms, which is titled "Recent Discoveries in Warm River Cave." It will chronicle the growth of the known cave from half a mile historically, to 4 miles since the breakout in 2013. Warm River is the longest actively thermal cave in the U. S., and probably the third longest such cave in the world. Some streams in the new section are even hotter (up to 100 degrees F) than the historic Hot Stream (85 degrees F). In addition to the expected stream passages, exploration has also revealed significant upper-level development requiring vertical work to reach. Exploration is ongoing.

Silent Auction - There will be the traditional Silent Auction at the banquet. Donations are welcome, or bring money to bid on the many treasures.

The Food - There are three menu options this year: slow-cooked beef brisket in Au Jus (gluten free), chicken marsala (gluten free in white wine sauce), and vegan kielbasa with peppers and onions (vegan/vegetarian friendly).
